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Re: Jaspen Park Naturalization

Hi Drew,

Thank you for meeting with me on June 19, 2015 to show me Jaspen Park and discuss the environmental issues associated with the shoreline, specifically Canada geese. As noted by Environment Canada (2010) geese pose many different threats, particularly to the environment by damaging plants, increasing erosion on banks and potentially contaminating water through fecal coliforms. As geese can also be aggressive towards humans when they are nesting or with their young this is also a problem for a public park.

The most important step to managing geese is to first understand their biology. The primary food source for Canada geese during the summer is new grass shoots as they are high in protein- so it is understandable why they like mowed lawns like that at Jaspen Park (Figure 1). Management strategies as outlined by Environment Canada (2010) recommend removing their sight lines of the grass and creating uncertainty of potential predators by adding barriers. The most aesthetic, cheap and environmentally friendly way to accomplish this is to plant a vegetative buffer of tall shrubs, grasses and wildflowers along the shoreline.




Figure 2. Proposed naturalization for Jaspen Park, Bala shoreline

With this being said, I will now recommend some good vegetation options that are native, or non-invasive that will do well along this shoreline (see Figure 2 for rough site plan).

Shrubs:

- Elderberry
- Fragrant sumac
- Smooth wild rose
- White snowberry
- Alternate leaved dogwood
- Broad-leaved meadow sweet
- Mountain juneberry
- Kalm's St. John's wart

Grasses:

- Indian grass
- Big bluestem
- Sweetgrass
- Feather reed grass

Wildflowers:

- Wild strawberry
- Black eyed susan
- Pale purple coneflower
- Tall coreopsis
- Common milkweed
- Wild bergamot
- New England aster
